Message to Members from the Board President

Entering the 21st Century to preserve Springfield's Heritage

The Historical Society took a HUGE step in October with the launch of the cataloging project. Financed by the Springfield Heritage Fund and a gift in memory of Alice Nulsen, the Board purchased the necessary supplies, computer and contracted for training. For two intense days, a few volunteers learned how best to preserve, handle and catalog the collection. Each item will be documented, numbered and photographed, a process that takes about 20 minutes per item. The documenting will be done initially on paper and then loaded into the digital file. Utilizing our investment in the PastPerfect Museum Software enables us to have a searchable database of all the items, artifacts and documents in our collection. The database will be cross-referenced by source, provenance, subject, type to name a few parameters. So this is a long term project!

But many hands make light work! So we hope you will join us! We have organized the New Hampshire Room in the heated library as a work area for processing as many items as possible over the winter, box by box! There are detailed instructions, a thorough manual and you can call the software company with any questions about the forms or software. You don't have to have computer skills – you can fill out the forms and others can input the information to the computer! A great winter project for anyone that can spare an hour or two! Community service hours for high schoolers!

A Unique Donation!

If you've driven by the Museum recently, you might have noticed a big new object on the lawn – a CANNON! Donated by the Alice Nulsen Trust, it has quite a story.

After World War I, the French government gave several Ivy League colleges a cannon in recognition of the number of college students that fought for France in the war. Dartmouth had its cannon on the green until the 1960s, when anti-war demonstrators would paint graffiti on it. So it was decided to remove it for safe keeping. That's when it made its way to Springfield – to the home of Fairfax Downey, a Yale graduate, who served in the U.S. Army in World War I as a captain of the 12th Field Artillery and as a lieutenant colonel in World War II. He had been doing research at Dartmouth for his military history books and seemed a natural keeper for the cannon – a howitzer like his military unit used.

Upon Fairfax's death in 1990, the cannon was moved to Faraway, home of Colonel Charles and Alice Nulsen on Philbrick Hill. Many stopped to photo the cannon displayed next to a tall wooden flagpole with the American flag, with a range of mountains as a backdrop. Each July 14th, the Nulsen family and friends would gather at the cannon to toast France's Bastille Day. And one year the cannon and flagpole adorned the cover photo of Springfield's annual report. Upon the death of Alice Nulsen in 2022, the family offered the cannon back to Dartmouth which declined the offer. Still in search of a home, the cannon was given to the Historical Society. Town resident Kevin Roberts never thought he would be using his big excavating equipment to move a cannon but he safely delivered it to the Museum. Come see a unique part of Springfield history!
